Barbara Hunt has sent a clipping regarding Manuka Honey which is quite interesting. Thank you, Barbara. As you may know, manuka trees are grown in New Zealand. “I heard about Wound Honey on National Public Radio in a segment about a woman whose foot had a non-healing ulcer despite 3 months of conventional treatment. The Rev. Lorenzo Lorraine Langstroth, known as the "Father of American Beekeeping" was born 200 years ago—in 1810—and will be honored with a national network of exhibits, workshops, and seminars. Many beekeepers are urging that a commemorative U. S. postage stamp be issued as well. Langstroth started with "two stocks of bees in common box hives" while serving as a minister in Andover, Massachusetts in the 1830s. He is credited with the discovery of "bee space" and the invention of the movable-frame beehive which allowed beekeepers to better battle the destructive wax moths and to collect surplus honey without harming the bees or damaging their honey combs.

This month is an excellent time to check your supplies and then go to your favorite bee supply catalog to order any bee equipment or hive supplies you may need. If some of your hive bodies need repair or frames need new foundation, take care of it now. This is also a good time to read some of those bee books or magazines you have so little time to read when other chores demand your attention. We will start taking order for bees and queens in February and early March; there probably will be a deadline for ordering in late March, so plan ahead and be ready to order after you've heard Clint Walker's talk at our January meeting.

Do you have a favorite recipe using honey? I'd like to hear from our members—I know we have a lot of good cooks among our members—so please email me or hand me a copy of your recipe at any of the meetings and I'll start using them in future newsletters. The recipe below was given me by my daughter-in-law, Jane. She had gotten it from her boss, Chris Brownson. It came from his Hungarian grandmother and he said it was one of their family favorites.

### **HONEY COOKIE RECIPE**

6 eggs  
4 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 tsp. baking soda  
6 big tablespoons of honey  
¼ tsp. ground ginger  
¼ tsp. ground cloves

In a big bowl, mix it up, work it out, put into refrigerator for about 1 hour. Then roll it out on the board, little at a time, about ¼ inch thick. Cut it out and put egg on top (egg is whole and just one). Bake at 375 degrees. Grease pan a little and bake cookies 6-8 minutes. Put in a well-covered container to soften. Leave about 1 week. Make 2-3 weeks before Christmas. (These directions were written by Chris' grandmother who said she didn't write English real good, hence the unusual wording of the directions. I feel sure the egg for the topping should be beaten before spreading. Ed.)
